Y6 RSE Letter June 2021

Dear Parent/Carer,

We believe that promoting the health and wellbeing of our pupils is an important part of their overall education. We do this through Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education. These lessons look at many topics, including physical/emotional health, all kind of relationships and living in the wider world. The aim of our PSHE lessons is to help our pupils make safe and informed decisions during their school years and beyond.

Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) is an important part of the PSHE curriculum; it provides pupils with knowledge and understanding of how the human body changes and how to form relationships in a responsible and healthy manner. We believe this will give pupils confidence to make positive choices now and in later life. **Relationships Education became statutory for all primary schools from September 2020 and our policy has been recently approved.**

We wanted to inform you that in the **next few weeks**, we will be teaching RSE to all pupils as part of their normal PSHE lessons.

Year 6 will be learning:

- About different types of relationships and what constitutes a positive relationship
- That they have rights over their own bodies and how to recognise appropriate and inappropriate behaviour in different relationships
- How and where to get support if a relationship makes them feel unhappy or unsafe
- The scientific names of body parts related to puberty and reproduction
- How and why the body changes during puberty

All teaching materials are appropriate to the age and emotional maturity of the pupils concerned and the teachers will aim to present the curriculum in an objective, balanced and sensitive manner. During these lessons, pupils will be able to ask questions, which will be answered factually and in an age-appropriate manner. Each pupil's privacy will be respected, and no one will be asked to reveal personal information.











Parents have the right to request that their child be withdrawn from some or all of sex education delivered as part of statutory RSE that does not also form part of the statutory National Curriculum for Science (see the grey section above). However, we believe that the presentation of sexual images in social and other media make it important that all young people have a place to discuss pressures, check facts and dispel myths. Even if a child is withdrawn, many pupils will discuss such issues with each other outside the classroom – so, rather than hear about the content second-hand, we hope all children will have the opportunity to take part in our carefully planned lessons. If you do wish to withdraw your child from some or all of the sex education section we ask that inform your child's class teacher by contacting remotesupport@barnesfarm-jun.essex.sch.uk stating your child's name and class clearly.

You may find that your child starts asking questions about the topic at home, or you might want to take the opportunity to talk to your child about issues before the work is covered in school.
