## Helping the NHS

Some staff from Barnes Farm Schools have been sewing to help the NHS. They have been making 'scrubs bags' for staff at Broomfield Hospital and for Chelmsford-based paramedics. The large drawstring bags are for staff to use at the end of a shift so they have a safer way to take home their uniform for washing. Home-sewers across the country have joined organisations such as 'For The Love Of Scrubs' and have been sewing scrubs, hats and bags for medical staff as there is a national shortage of such items. ## Home learning resources

You will probably be aware that a coordinated, national effort has been made to try and provide high quality home learning resources for all year groups across the country. This has resulted in content added to the existing BBC Bitesize website and a brand new website

resource called Oak National Academy - <a href="https://www.thenational.academy/">https://www.thenational.academy/</a>, both of which launched in their current format this week.

We have looked carefully at these resources and believe that, at this time and in these circumstances, the online teaching available from the Oak National Academy is going to be a particularly useful method of home learning. This is especially because there are videos to view of teachers leading through a unit of lessons and exploring/explaining the content, which are sequenced across a week and sometimes over several weeks. As with any method of home learning, this cannot properly replace your child's learning with their teacher in their own class at school, but we think it could be better than sending pupil documents to download and work through via eSchools.

The Oak National Academy website has three hours of learning every day for all year groups, broken down into English, Maths and one other subject. The resources are high quality and age appropriate. There is no downloading or photocopying required therefore pupils will be able to access learning more easily via laptops, tablets or even mobile phones.

When setting home learning for next week, the teachers will still direct children using the homework tab on eSchools as they have been doing, but no documents or overview sheets will be uploaded, just some instructions about where to look for the Oak National Academy resources. We will be actually using Week 1 - Week beginning 20th April - so we will be one week behind. This then allows our teachers to familiarise themselves with the content before children access it (next week's work is not available to view yet, hence the need to work a week behind). Teachers will use the time they would have spent on preparing and uploading resources to instead support and answer questions from pupils/parents if these are presented through eSchools.

We hope you will find this an improvement on the accessibility and ease with which your child/children can engage best with learning in the home environment.





## Keeping in touch

Thank you to all the pupils who have been keeping in touch with their class teachers. Please remember to ask children to do this once a week as this will help teachers continue to fulfil their duty of care towards their class. It can be a message about work or other things they have been doing at home and need not be very long. Although we are officially closed, we still retain certain responsibilities and teachers will need to follow up by phone if they haven't heard from pupils on a regular basis.






Harry from Year 3 has created a poster about the silver lining impact of Coronavirus... a huge reduction in air pollution!

## Marconi and Chelmsford

- Full name Guglielmo Giovanni Maria Marconi
- ❖ Born on the 25<sup>th</sup> April 1874 in Bologna, Italy
- ❖ Died on 20<sup>th</sup> July 1937 in Rome, Italy
- He was an Italian inventor and electrical engineer
- Winner of a Noble Prize in Physics
- Marconi was married twice and had 5 children.

Holly from Year 4 sent in this powerpoint all about the Year 4 topic of Denmark:












Fiona from Year 4 has been busy in the last week. She made a face mask out of recycled trousers which could be worn on both sides as they have different patterns.
