1st meal eaten:

tall and he was young

Discovery:  
The Lindwold man's leg  
was discovered by  
Andy Mould on the  
1<sup>st</sup> August 1984. His  
death is still a murder  
mystery because  
nobody knows how and  
why he got murdered.  
A dedicated archaeologist  
team Wheat and Wisniew-  
ski found the rest of his body.
